MINUTES OF THE BRIDGEWATER TOWNSHIP COUNCIL AUGUST 15, 2024 - COUNCIL CHAMBERS

The Township Council of the Township of Bridgewater, County of Somerset, State of New Jersey, convened in a regular session on Thursday, August 15, 2024, at 7:30 p.m. in Council Chambers in the Municipal Complex, Bridgewater, New Jersey 08807 & via Live Online Broadcast.

Minutes

JULY 18, 2024 & AUGUST 1, 2024 - REGULAR SESSION

On motion of Councilman Norgalis, seconded by Councilman Kirsh, the July 18, 2024, and August 1, 2024, regular session minutes were approved and passed unanimously on a voice call vote.

JULY 18, 2024 & AUGUST 1, 2024 – CLOSED SESSIONS

The July 18, 2024, and August 1, 2024, closed session minutes were passed around for Council approval & signature.

Council Reports

Councilman Kirsh:

 On August 6th, Councilman Kirsh attended a Planning Board meeting where a subdivision on Mountain Top Road was approved with several conditions following extensive discussion. The board also addressed a redevelopment area near Foothill Road, as well as addressed the amended Master Plan Housing Plan.

- The Planning Board met again on August 13th to memorialize several actions from the previous meeting.
- On August 13th, the Zoning Board reviewed a case for 821 Bridgewater LLC, involving the JCC.
- Councilman Kirsh participated in an event at Camp Cromwell with Mayor Moench and Congressman Kean.
- Councilman Kirsh visited Avnos, a new business operating on Milltown Road, that has made a commitment to using technology to remove CO2 from ambient air.
- Councilman Kirsh attended the Senior Citizen Appreciation Day and expressed anticipation for this annual event.

Councilman Kurdyla:

- Attended the third Recreation and Open Space Master Plan meeting.
- Councilman Kurdyla informed the council that he had met with several residents to discuss the ongoing speeding issue in Bridgewater. He proposed holding a meeting with the council, administration, and Chief Mitzak to explore the possibility of installing speed bumps in affected areas

Councilman Norgalis: (verbatim)

- Continued personal discussions with Warren Mayor Victor Sordillo regarding
 the billing to Warren for Warren sewerage conveyed through Bridgewater. The
 heavy lifting and documentation on this subject had already been worked on
 by Tom Genova, Michael Pappas and Bill Savo over many months. We are
 attempting to update somewhat vague contract wording dating back decades.
 More to follow after my planned telephone call with Mayor Sordillo tomorrow
 morning.
- Participated in numerous email exchanges, telephone and conferences dealing with police vehicle fleet maintenance and procurement. As a township we continue to struggle with parts availability and as importantly the escalating costs of repair parts for all of the vehicles used by the township. Under Supt. Richard Shimp the vehicle maintenance staff, read that mechanics, make valiant attempts to reuse and repurpose parts from retired vehicles to keep line vehicles on the road but ALWAYS, ALWAYS to insure they are safe to operate.

- I would like to revisit a subject I talked about several years ago that being streel lights not working. The township, under contract with both JCP&L (basic electric coverage is West of County Club Rd) and PSE&G covers the traffic costs of various street light fixtures xx. We pay for these fixtures whether they are working or not. I am somewhat frustrated to ride down a street at night and see one or more lights not working. We are paying but not getting a service. BUT the electric company does not patrol for light outage they rely on reports from employees and residents. I will discuss a township reporting process with Mr. Pappas.
- Road work in the township continues on two fronts. First, we have the formal five-year plan frequently discussed at numerous Council meetings in each of the six township areas. Then we have the PSE&G mill and overlay on some streets as negotiated by the Administration to address the issue of PSE&G gas line replacement. A good example is the Talamini work from 202/206 to the JCC Driveway completed this week. More on that in the future.
- Speaking of PSE&G gas line replacement, that work either in the street or in the hookup by PSE&G EMPLOYEES will continue for some time. I underscore that only PSE&G credentialed employees will be doing the hookup inside of your home or businesses. If someone other than a PSE&G employee comes to your door to say they are going to hook up your new gas line inside the home DO NOT LET THEM IN. Check first with the Township Administration.
- A question that I have been asked numerous times is "will I have gas shut off in the house with my new line?" The answer according to township engineer Bill Burr is "no, you main shut off will be outside by the newly installed gas meter." You can however, at your expense, hire your own contractor to install an inside gas shutoff should you prefer.

Councilman Pedroso: (verbatim)

 Congratulations to Bridgewater-Raritan High School graduate Casey Murphy for winning the gold medal at the Paris Olympics. Casey was a soccer star here at Bridgewater-Raritan, went on to play for Rutgers, and has achieved so much in her young, blossoming soccer career. Like many in our Bridgewater community, I look forward to watching Casey's continued success.

Casey competes in women's soccer, where she rightfully faces other women. It's common sense that women should compete with women in physical sports; allowing men to compete alongside them would create an unfair advantage.

Yet, this common sense is being challenged on today's athletic fields. Transgender girls and women are often allowed to compete in female sports,

and at times, this results in physical advantages that make it impossible for cisgender females to compete fairly.

I empathize with transgender women as they seek their place in sports. They deserve fair, equitable opportunities to compete, just as all people do. Equal treatment must extend to everyone, including transgender women.

However, when one group's rights overshadow another's, we cross the line from equality to preferential treatment. Women have fought for centuries to gain equality with men. Within that struggle, they've had to carve out their place in the sports world—a world historically dominated by men that often-suppressed women's participation.

Now, transgender women are fighting for their place in sports. But their physical advantages can place biological women at a disadvantage, sometimes even in harm's way. Transgender women have the right to compete in sports, but not at the expense of fairness for cisgender women and the progress made in women's rights.

As these issues become more prevalent, they will undoubtedly touch upon our Bridgewater-Raritan schools. I urge our Board of Education to stand firm for equality and protect the rights of our young biological girls, ensuring they have a fair and level playing field—just as Casey Murphy did.

Council President Ring:

- Council President Ring was honored to attend the ribbon-cutting ceremony and grand opening of 'Success on the Spectrum' (SOS), located at 745 Route 202/206. This franchise, owned by local residents including Mahish, serves individuals with autism aged 18 months to 18 years.
- Participated in an event at Camp Cromwell with Mayor Moench and Congressman Kean.
- Council President Ring attended the Senior Citizen Appreciation Day. Bridgewater recognized all seniors for their contributions to the community over the years. He congratulated Jennifer Osterberg, the director of the Senior Center, on her outstanding program.
- Participated in various meetings with the administration regarding budgets, police vehicles, and PBA contracts.
- Congratulated all athletes who participated in the Olympics, especially former Bridgewater-Raritan High School goalie Casey Murphy for her gold medal win

Mayor's Reports

Mayor Matthew C. Moench

- Mayor Moench announced that Bridgewater has received the four-milliondollar check from Congressman Kean's office for Camp Cromwell Improvements. He expressed his gratitude to Congressman Kean for his support in securing the grant.
- Attended a tour of the Avnos facility, which is a company that is at the cutting edge of carbon removal systems. Avnos is developing and researching this technology in Bridgewater Township. Mayor Moench welcomed Avnos and stated that they plan to double in size within a year.
- Mayor Moench attended an event at the Senior Center and commended Jennifer Osterberg on her phenomenal job with the program. He thanked the seniors for their contributions to the township.
- Thanked Gabriel's Fountain for visiting the municipal building for an ice cream social with employees
- Congratulated Casey Murphy on her Olympic gold medal win and expressed hope for a local celebration of her achievement. Mayor Moench mentioned that her brother, Kyle Murphy, is active in town and involved in the wrestling community and as a high school freshman football coach.
- Attended the wake of former Bridgewater Township police officer Thomas J.
 Dinan. Mayor Moench recognized his accomplishments and dedication to the township during his 27 years of service.
- Met with the owners of the Bridgewater Commons Mall, who plan to present their vision to the council in the fall. Mayor Moench expressed that their vision aligns with the township's goals.
- Mayor Moench stated that there are some cul-de-sacs around town with islands in the middle of them. As the township has repaved roads, some of the islands have been removed. He stated that the township's goal is to remove all islands as they require maintenance which isn't always executed. Mayor Moench asked that the Engineering Division and Public Works Department develop a policy regarding the removal of islands and improved communication with residents.

2024 Municipal Budget

PUBLIC HEARING ON THE 2024 MUNICIPAL BUDGET

On motion of Councilman Kirsh, seconded by Councilman Kurdyla, the meeting was opened to the public.

Cathy Franco - 766 Weemac Road, Bridgewater, NJ 08807

Ms. Franco stated that the overdue adoption of the budget is a disservice to the public. She also offered suggestions for the allocation of funds.

Sarika Maheshwari - 1020 Sunset Ridge, Bridgewater, NJ 08807

Ms. Maheshwari expressed concern over the condition of the roads in town. She stated that if the roads aren't repaired, there will be damage to resident's cars.

ADOPTION OF 2024 MUNICIPAL BUDGET

Mayor Moench thanked the council for their input throughout the budget process. He believes the budget meets the community's service needs while maintaining financial responsibility.

Councilman Pedroso stated that he will be voting "No" on the budget. He offered that the amount to be raised by taxation is very high and suggested it would be prudent for the governing body to consider making cuts either in departments or budgetary items.

Councilman Kirsh acknowledged that there were many collaborative meetings between Administration and the Budget/Finance Committee, in addition to bringing in council members separately to gain their input. He stated that this is a difficult budget as the township faces a substantial number of mandates, new expectations and new requirements. Councilman Kirsh highlighted three (3) positive key areas of the budget: investments in transparency, public safety, and debt management.

Council President Ring expressed that the budget represents a compromise and that it was impossible to meet all requests. He thanked the budget committee and fellow council members for their hard work and contributions.

Public Comment

Members of the public wishing to address the Council on any matter will be allowed two minutes to speak unless there are unusual circumstances.

• Cathy Franco - 766 Weemac Road, Bridgewater, NJ 08807

Ms. Franco questioned the late release of the audit to the public and expressed concerns about the transparency of the wording in resolutions on the agendas. She encouraged Councilman Pedroso to use alternative platforms for making statements instead of council meetings.

Joseph Deren – 543 Foothill Road, Bridgewater, NJ 08807

Mr. Deren expressed frustration over the lack of notice and communication regarding the removal of islands and trees on his cul-de-sac. He was informed that the island needed to be removed for emergency vehicle access. Mr. Deren stated that he and his neighbors were not given the opportunity to discuss the decision before it was made.

Dan Zolinski – 715 Chimney Rock Road, Bridgewater, NJ 08807

Mr. Zolinski stated that although he has concerns regarding the tax increase this year, he is also worried about what will happen next year. He stated that the residents should be given more time to understand the budget.

Sarika Maheshwari - 1020 Sunset Ridge, Bridgewater, NJ 08807

Ms. Maheshwari asked the council how long it would take to repave all the roads in Bridgewater and stated that her road has not been repaved in five years.

Council President Ring explained that the township is currently in the fourth year of a five-year road improvement plan and provided Ms. Maheshwari with a website to check the street ratings.

John Arcoleo – 1110 Washington Valley Rd., Bridgewater, NJ 08836

Mr. Arcoleo expressed concerns about the amount of funds allocated for future road repaying in the township.

ADDING CHAPTER 63 TO THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP CONCERNING LEAD-BASED PAINT INSPECTIONS

Township Administrator Pappas explained that all municipalities, with certain exceptions, are now required to inspect every single-family, two-family, and multiple rental dwelling located within the municipality for lead-based paint hazards at tenant turnover.

On motion of Councilman Kirsh, seconded by Councilman Norgalis, the meeting was opened to the public.

Ms. Franco requested clarification of the ordinance. Council President Ring explained that the ordinance applies to both residential and commercial properties, which will need to be inspected by the township.

Councilman Pedroso stated that this is now a state law requirement and that passing this ordinance would bring the township into compliance.

Councilman Norgalis added that the law was passed in 2022, but the state provided the township with a two-year window to meet all requirements.

Council President Ring thanked Councilman Norgalis for his persistence in working with the administration on this ordinance.
